This document has been checked for information on Native American burials. No images considered to be culturally insensitive, including images and drawings of burials, Ancestors, funerary objects, and other NAGPRA material were found.



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A CURRENT INVENTORY OF KNOWN CULTURAL RESOURCES ON OSSABAW ISLAND, GEORGIA

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ABSTRACT

This report presents a preliminary inventory of the cultural features on the five main areas of Ossabaw Island. Information within this report include a bibliographic index, all currently known historic maps, and basic lists of extant and previously existing structures identified in photographs. Finally, a brief overview of archaeological sites is also included. This report will serve as a substantial aid for future investigations by providing researchers with a baseline inventory to further aid in the understanding of the broader historical context of the island's cultural resources, as well as help to assess threats to preservation of the landscape and the built environment.




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Introduction

Georgia's barrier islands have been home to human inhabitants for over 4500 years. Native American settlements once flourished up and down the Georgia Coast in a manner that is almost unimaginable today. Early European settlements are also found across the islands and remain only in documentation or in ruin. With the spread of old world disease and forced relocation of Native peoples, Georgia's barrier islands were developed to fit the changing needs of European settlers (Thompson and Worth 2011). Ossabaw Island is one of those places impacted and imprinted by multiple settlements and occupations, including the agricultural practices of the past. Managed by the state since 1978, Ossabaw Island is Georgia's first designated heritage preserve. Ossabaw's history is a confluence of cultural landscapes that chronicle the complicated story of human modification to the landscape from the first Native American settlement to the Plantation Period. As a Heritage Preserve, the island is not subject to the threat of development; however, portions are in danger due to sea level rise and rapid erosion. In order to address these issues now and in the future, it is essential that there is a comprehensive inventory of all past and present cultural resources, as well as previous research that can be referenced in future planning.

We begin our discussion of the cultural resources of the island by first presenting background information for the island. This includes a brief historical overview of the island, then a short discussion of previous archaeological and historic preservation research. This is followed by a short description of documentary resources (primary and secondary) and available historical maps on the island. After this, we go through the five main areas of the island, the North End, Middle Place, Buckhead, South End, and the Torrey West estate and present an initial list of previous and extant structures based on historic maps and photographs. Next, we present a brief description of archaeological sites by time period. Our intent here is not to go into great detail and synthesize or analyze the data but rather create short compendiums by area which future researchers can utilize and build upon. Finally, we conclude with a brief discussion and ideas for future research.

Brief History of Ossabaw Island

Ossabaw Island's human history goes back prior to 4,000 years ago and Native American settlements can be found all over the island. However, by the early 1700s, old world diseases and forced relocations decimated the Native American populations of the Georgia Coast (Thompson and Worth 2011). Beginning in the mid-1700s, the island came into the possession of a series of owners. First was Mary Musgrove Bosomworth, who is the earliest documented owner. Her ownership was relatively short-lived and the island was put up for public auction in 1760. It subsequently went through several owners before John Morel, Sr. purchased the island in 1763 (Elliott 2007:13-15).

Morel immediately began modifying the island for indigo and harvesting timber for shipbuilding, later using the land for other agricultural ventures. After his death, the island was divided into three tracts (North End, Middle Place, and South End) according to his will, although it took several decades for the will to be properly enacted. Bryan Morel inherited the North End and his family continued to work and live on this portion. The area referred to as Middle Place went to Peter Morel for a short time until it was purchased by David Johnston and later turned into a

cotton plantation by Alexander McDonald. The area on the southern portion of the island, South End, went to John Morel Jr. who used the area for indigo and cotton production. South End passed through several owners until George J. Kollock purchased the island in 1849. Kollock started a cotton plantation and built numerous structures for his diverse agricultural endeavors. A fourth tract, Buckhead, was created and inherited by Mary Ann Morel after the death of her father, John Morel Jr.. After obtaining the Buckhead tract, Mary Ann Morel married Nathaniel Greene Rutherford and the land was cultivated, albeit on a small scale, until 1828 when the land was foreclosed upon. The land later went to Mary Rutherford Skrine Simmons who had a small cotton plantation. While the scale and intensity of agriculture varied among the various areas of the island, there was a plantation period occupation on each tract between the late 1700s and 1860s (Elliott 2005; Elliott 2007:14-24; Price 2007:22-34).

By 1861, its owners, due to the Civil War, abandoned Ossabaw. At the war's end in 1865, Major General William Tecumseh Sherman issued Special Orders, Number 15, which provided land on Ossabaw to be assigned to newly freed slaves. In 1866, 78 people were living on the island, although exactly where is unclear (Elliott 2005:34; Elliott 2007:44; Duncan 1986:20,26). However, property soon reverted back to the original owners when President Andrew Johnson rescinded Sherman's orders, but it appears that the freed slaves continued to live on the island (Elliott 2005:35). The 1880 census indicates that there were 180 people on the island (Foskey 2001:17). A hurricane in 1898 devastated Ossabaw causing most of the population to abandon the island, except for six people according to the 1910 census (Elliott 2005:8).

Again, the various tracts of Ossabaw during the time after the end of the Civil War went through a series of owners until the Strachan Shipping Company sold the island to Dr. Henry Norton Torrey in 1924. In 1961, Eleanor Torrey West and her husband began the Ossabaw Island project, which brought scholars to the island. Other projects were created such as the Genesis Project, lasting from 1970 until 1983. This endeavor involved groups of students who would live on Ossabaw for a certain time while pursuing personal goals such as writing to finish their degrees. In general, the Genesis Project was a collaborative effort where the students lived in a communal setting, grew their own food, and lived a minimalist lifestyle (Foskey 2001:8; Keister 1992; King 2015:438-449; Price 2014:56).

In 1978, the family sold all but 24 acres of the island to the state of Georgia as the state's first Heritage Preserve and in 1995, the entire island was listed on the National Register of Historic Places (Elliott 2007:10).

Brief Research Overview

Archaeology on Ossabaw

The earliest interest in the archaeology of Ossabaw Island can be dated to 1873 when D. Brown reported on shell heaps on the island (Brown 1873:423). Before 1891, W.H. Phillips made collections on the island that are now curated at the Smithsonian (Holmes 1893:109). The cultural resources of the island are briefly mentioned by Clarence B. Moore in the journal, *American Anthropologist* (Moore 1904). Ossabaw was also mentioned by archaeologists by William H. Holmes in a 1903 Bureau of American Ethnology volume on pottery portrayed an example of a

late prehistoric vessel (likely Irene Complicated Stamped). Clarence B. Moore visited the island in 1896 and makes mention of many of the prehistoric sites on the island and investigated nine mounds, primarily located on the northwestern side of the island, at Middle Place. It would not be until much later before any additional professional archaeological survey or excavations were completed on the island. In the 1960s, Gordon and Rebecca Midgette, University of Georgia archaeology students, conducted a small survey and conducted limited excavations on the island, but no records exist of this research (Elliott 2007:9). Following this, in 1971, Chester DePratter and Donald Crusoe conducted limited excavations at 9CH35, Cane Patch. Other archaeological surveys were conducted throughout the 1970s by a series of individuals. Patrick Garrow and his students from Shorter College recorded some sites in 1972-1973. This work was continued by Chester DePratter in 1974 (DePratter 1974). Charles Pearson conducted excavations on several areas on the island from 1974-1977 (Pearson 1975, 1976, 1977, 2001). With the exception of several shipwrecks being recorded around Ossabaw in the late 1990s, additional archaeological research did not begin again until 2001, when Georgia Department of Natural Resources Historic Preservation Division (GDNR HPD) began regular, but limited, investigations on sites around the island. This continues today (Rogers 1999a; 1999b; 1999c; 1999d). In 2003, Dan Elliott, with the Lamar Institute working with GDNR HPD and the Ossabaw Island Foundation, began excavations on the North End, focusing on the tabby structural remains (Elliott 2003, 2005, 2006a, 2006b, 2008a). This work provided the baseline for the historic preservation of the tabby remains. Sporadic work around the island has continued with mitigation work on the South End, shovel test surveys and limited excavations at Middle Place, and on sites just south of Buckhead, as well as continued focus on areas on the northern portion of the island (Cane Patch) and at the North End In 2014, University of Georgia (UGA) began working with GDNR HPD and the Ossabaw Island Foundation on the South End site and conducted mitigation excavations in anticipation of a shoreline mitigation project (Ritchison 2016 Ritchison et al. 2016a). Investigations continued in 2015 with UGA working on the Buckhead site and DNR HPD archaeologists beginning new research at Middle Place (Colvin and Lulewicz 2016; Ritchison et al 2016b). Research by UGA and GDNR HPD will continue in the future.

Historic Preservation on Ossabaw

Historic preservation attempts on Ossabaw, have been in general, minimal, with a focus on the North End (see Barrickman 2004, Burke et al. 2007; Burke and Chase 2007; Burke 2008, Cullison 1992a, 1992b, 1992c, 1992d, 1992e, 1992f, 1992g, 1992h, Edwards 1996, Elliott 2003 and 2007, and the 2005 National Register Nomination Form). David Cullisonincludes brief information on the Clubhouse, Boarding House, Maintenance Shop, Barn, and three Tabby Cabins in a historic resources survey (Cullison 1992a, 1992b, 1992c, 1992d, 1992e, 1992f, 1992g, 1992h). In 2004 and 2005, George Fore, an architectural conservator, wrote two reports on the Tabby cabins and Smokehouse and made conservation recommendations (Fore 2004 and 2005). Also in 2004, collaborative efforts led by the Ossabaw Island Foundation, and students from Georgia State University in a Conservation of Historic Buildings and Materials class under the direction of Richard Laub prepared a full assessment and treatment recommendation for the tabby buildings (Barrickman et al 2004). Additional portions of their survey identified "several visible surface features" to be further investigated by systematic shovel testing (Elliott 2007:10). In 2007, Dan Elliott conducted work at and around the tabby structures on the North End to understand the buildings, as well as the people who resided within, used, and owned them (Elliott 2007:1). As part of student and intern projects at Savannah College of Art and Design, a Historic

Architectural Building Survey (HABS) condition Assessment was written on the Oyster House (also called the Power House, Ice House, and Smokehouse) on the North End and on the tabby structures at Middle Place (Burke et al. 2007; Burke and Chase 2007, 2008).

In general, preservation and conservation attempts, although limited across the island broadly, have been concentrated on the extant structures on the North End. This work has proved successful with focused rehabilitation efforts at the tabby cabins, the Clubhouse, and the Boarding House. Overall, the plantation period structures dating into the 20th century, as well as the Genesis Project era, located in Middle Place, have seen no preservation or management efforts of the extant resources. The Genesis Project resources currently fall below the 50 year minimum age requirement, as outlined by the Department of the Interior and National Register standards. Special consideration should be made for their inclusion under the ownership and management of the Department of Natural Resources and these resources should be considered in future preservation and management plans. There are not any standing historical resources on the South End and with the exception of a brick concentration, likely from a chimney, no extant structures remain at Buckhead.

Documentary Resources

Summary of Primary Sources

In this section, we briefly discuss primary and secondary documentation that directly pertains to Ossabaw and describe historic maps that depict the island. The bibliographic index (Appendix A) includes all of the current information pertaining to the island and its cultural resources that we could locate.

There are several primary collections of archival records that provide much of the documentation that is available for Ossabaw Island. The Ossabaw Island and Torrey family papers, located in Savannah at the Georgia Historical Society (GHS), contain information on records from 1699-2007. The collection includes papers and records associated with the Torrey family, information on the various scientific and cultural programs that have occurred on the island, title history of the island, and records for the Ossabaw Island Foundation, in addition to historical documentations of maps, slave inventories, and other manuscripts. The Georgia Historical Society also contains a collection of documents that shed light on the plantation period on Ossabaw. The Kollock family papers consist of information about the Kollock family from the years of 1791-1876. The collection contains George J. Kollock's personal letters, diaries, overseer records, and letters that provide information on the South End plantation on Ossabaw. A third collection is located in the Southern Historical Collection at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. The George J. Kollock Plantation Journals, 1837-1861 consists of all of Kollock's journals for his three plantations, including the South End. The journals, written primarily by his overseers, provide data on plantation management and agricultural life, as well as a glimpse into the lives of the enslaved through records of births, deaths, sick days, and everyday tasks.

While the above-mentioned collections represent the bulk of historical documentation, there are other minor primary sources for information about Ossabaw found in other locations or collections. The Georgia Historical Society contains information on Ossabaw located in the William Hughes and

Horace Bertrand Folsom Family Papers. The Georgia Department of Archives and History through the Vanishing Georgia digital library contains photographs of Ossabaw (http://dlg.galileo.usg.edu/vanga/?Welcome). The Georgia Department of Archives contains the will of John Morel (Morel 1774). The Hargrett Rare Book and Manuscript Library at the University of Georgia contains various documents, such as information on the 1760 indenture by Henry Ellis and Thomas Mary Bosomworth (Ellis et al. 1760). The Keith Read Collection at the Hargrett also contains information on Isaac Levy. Newspaper clippings from the Georgia Gazette, Atlanta Constitution, and Augusta Chronicle can also provide information on happenings on the island, including the advertisements of supplies, goods, property for sale, or information on slaves, etc. Census records, deed books from Chatham County, and the online records of the Freedmen's Bureau (http://freedmensbureau.com/) all contain historical records concerning life on the island. The Georgia Historical Quarterly has various articles that contain transcribed documents on Ossabaw. Susan Kollock in 1950 published a transcribed collection of letters on the Kollock family, containing information on George J. Kollock and the South End. A typed copy of the 1777 inventory and appraisal of John Morel is located at University of North Carolina (Hamilton 1947). Information on Henri Bourquin is located in the Georgia Department of Archives and History (Alexander 1970). The British Public Record Office in the National Archives in England contains the petition of Isaac Levy for Ossabaw (http://discovery.nationalarchives.gov.uk/details/r/C7717565).

Again, the documents and collections mentioned here represent a general summary of documentation discovered so far. For sake of clarity, we do not mention within this text all of the sources that have been explored (see Appendix A for a more complete list). Many of these records were first included within the primary baseline for research by Elliott (2005; 2007; 2008a) in preparation for his fieldwork at the North End. Elliott (2005; 2007; 2008a) explored the literature and documents extensively for information about the Morel occupation, specifically on the North End, although he discusses information for the South End and other parts of the island (all future research should consult Elliott 2007 for his archival review). King (2015) builds upon this research and includes many documents about the British claims to the island prior to Morel ownership. In addition, King (2015) included an analysis of early maps of the island and place-names for Ossabaw. King also provides a detailed analysis of the history of the island after its purchase by the Torrey family, and its subsequent purchase by the state of Georgia. There has also been some recent research on historical documents related to Middle Place by George Price (2007, 2014). Price consulted the following resources: Ossabaw Island Papers (GHS Collection No. 1326), the Morel Family Register (Mordecai 1847), and transcribed copies of the Georgia Gazette, deeds, and tax records. As a result, he was able to provide the most complete social history of Middle Place currently available. As of this report, a detailed analysis of the historical documents associated with the South End or Buckhead had not yet occurred.

In general, there are not many historic documents known to exist that detail information on other portions of Ossabaw other than the North End and South End. It appears that records concerning the use and occupation of Buckhead has had the least amount of historical research and very little by way of inclusion in any historical narrative. By far, historical records from Kollock's ownership of the South End on Ossabaw are the most numerous; however, the wealth of information located in the Ossabaw and Torrey Family Papers must not be overlooked.

Summary of Secondary Sources

After Ossabaw was purchased by the Torrey family in the 1920s, Henry Norton Torrey selfpublished a brief history of the island based on knowledge he gained from historical documents (Torrey 1926). In 1934, the National Geographic featured an article by W. Robert Moore on the Georgia coast and also depicted the North End tabby structures (Moore 1934). Dorothy Magoffin in 1938 wrote a biographical assessment of George J. Kollock, and included information about the South End of Ossabaw (Magoffin 1938). Published in the North Carolina Historical Review, this work provides useful information on the South End. In 1950, Edith Duncan Johnston published a book containing biographical information on the Houstoun and Johnston families. information on George Kollock and his wife Susan Marion Johnston (Johnston 1950). Daniel H. Redfearn in 1954 wrote a book about Alexander McDonald that contains information about his tenure at Middle Place (Redfearn 1954). Charles E. Pearson in 1976 completed a masters' thesis and dissertation analyzing late prehistoric sites on the island (Pearson 1976 and 1979). As mentioned previously, the island was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1996 (Edwards 1996). This nomination form accumulated much of the historical and archaeological data at the time. The island was also included as a chapter in Georgia's Land of the Golden Isles by Burnette Vanstory (1981). This research includes a general overview of the island. Although useful for providing a summary of the history of the island up to Ossabaw's acquirement by the state of Georgia, there is little by way of citation of facts within in the summary making it difficult for researchers to go back to the original sources. William K. Scarborough (1984) in his research on overseers in the plantation South, briefly discussed George J. Kollock's relationships with his overseers, especially related to the punishment of enslaved individuals (Scarborough 1984: 13, 94, 121). Margaret Ann Keister in 1992 completed a dissertation detailing the Ossabaw Island Project. James Oakes (1998:66, 165, 174) includes very briefly some information on Kollock and the slaves on the South End. In "What Nature Suffers to Groe": Life, Labor, and Landscape on the Georgia Coast, 1680-1920 by Mart A. Stewart (2002:166,168) used the documents associated with the South End during Kollock's ownership and briefly includes example of Kollock's plantation strategies of using manure and marsh mud as fertilizer.

Buddy Sullivan in his book From Beautiful Zion to Red Bird Creek: A History of Bryan County, Georgia, Including Chronicles of the Old Canoochee-Ogeechee River Country, provides general background information on Ossabaw. In 2001, Ann Foskey published in the Images of America series on Ossabaw Island. This book has been a recent valuable addition for current research on the island due to the inclusion of many maps, photographs, and brief historical information about the island and its various components. Suzanne McDaniel VanDeMark in her 2003 dissertation analyzed the cultural landscape of the gardens on the Torrey West estate. A chapter in the book African American Life in the Georgia Lowcountry: The Atlantic World and the Gullah Geechee (Race in the Atlantic World, 1700-1900) by Allison Dorsey (2011) present an analysis of the freed black community after the Civil War by looking at the demographic, social, and economic aspects during the years of 1865-1900. Another inclusion is work by Dea Boster (2011; 2015) who discussed disabilities recorded on southern plantations and includes information about Kollock's treatment of his slaves on the South End. Paul Pressly's *On the Rim of the Caribbean*: Colonial Georgia and the British Atlantic World (2013) work presented a look at the economic and agricultural growth of colonial Georgia. Included are tidbits about Ossabaw, its plantation inhabitants and their contribution to the cultural and economic changes occurring to Georgia's

colony. Ossabaw is also briefly summarized by Paul Pressly in the book *Slavery and Freedom in Savannah* (Pressly 2014). Finally, Linda Orr King in her 2015 dissertation work compiled an extensive reference list of unpublished manuscripts, maps, letters, oral histories, media, and other historic documents pertaining to Ossabaw (King 2015).

It should be noted here that that there are other histories of coastal counties that include general background information about Ossabaw (see Elliott 2007:6 for a list). For example, details about the formation of Chatham and Bryan counties (transfer of Ossabaw between the two counties), as well as the creation of parishes along the coast are included in those sources. Finally, there have been many archaeological reports and manuscripts concerning the numerous archaeological components of the island as well as several reports written on the historic preservation of the North End. These will not be discussed in detail here, please refer to Appendix A for a complete reference list.

Historical Maps Overview

There are numerous maps known to depict the various occupations and their iterations on Ossabaw. With the exception of King's (2015) recent research, in general there has been minimal work on the various maps representing the island and little has been published. The maps presented here are ones that were found in simple searches on the internet as well as digital copies retrieved from the Ossabaw Island Foundation website (see Appendix B-C).

The 1562 Parreus map of French Florida shows the coastal islands of Georgia, but does not place Ossabaw between the Ogeechee and Savannah rivers. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1591 Jacques Le Moyne de Morgues map shows the coastal islands of Georgia and places Ossabaw between the River Bellum (Ogeechee) and the River Gironda (Savannah) during the 1560s. Ossabaw is named Ouade on this map. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1670 Antonio de Arredondo map the coastal islands of Georgia and names Ossabaw island as Asaba. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1720 Moll map was commissioned three years after Sir Robert Montgomery was granted land rights to create the "Margravate of Azilia." This map includes references to the Golden Isles including Ossabaw. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1757 John Gerar William DeBraham map details the Georgia coast and Ossabaw Island. This map names Ossabaw as Hosaba. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1760 Yonge and DeBrahm map is the earliest known of Ossabaw that offers detailed information about the island. The map is divided up between western (6,000 acres) and eastern divisions (1600 acres). The western division is then further divided into twelve 500 acre lots. Lot 1 is located at the south end of the island with Lot 12 being on the northern end.

The 1778 John Lodge map depicts the islands of Georgia and South Carolina. Ossabaw is identified as Ossaba on this map. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1779 map from The Universal Magazine Vol. 64 depicts Ossabaw but names the island Hassabaw. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1780 J.F.W Des Barres Chart of the Georgia coast shows Ossabaw but only in rough form. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1780 Archibald Campbell map depicts Ossabaw and names the island Hossabaw. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

A 1780 map of part of the coast of Georgia provides a detailed depiction of Ossabaw, labeled as Osebaw. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1789 Jedidiah Morse map depicts Ossabaw along with the other islands on the Georgia coast. Ossabaw is identified as Osebaw. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1796 Jedidiah Morse map shows changing county lines for Ossabaw Island. This map depicts Ossabaw in Chatham County, the island was incorporated into Bryan County in 1793. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1814 Enoch Gridley map depicts Ossabaw island and demonstrates evidence that the island was still being referred to as Hassabaw as late as 1814. No road, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1822 Anthony Finely Company map of Bryan County depicts Ossabaw within that county. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1849 Augusta Mitchell maps map of Bryan County depicts Ossabaw within that county. No roads, structures, or any other features are depicted.

The 1855 William Hughes map shows the middle portion of Ossabaw and primarily focuses on the Middle Place tract of land, although it does show the property boundaries with Joseph T. Simmon's land on the Buckhead tract and it also depicts some land owned by Bryan Morel from the North End section. The map does not show any structures on the island, but it does depict mounds, paths, and old fields. Whether these old fields are strictly from aboriginal use or cattle ranges is unknown. Likely, it was a combination of both.

1859 NOAA Coastal Survey Sketch E, Showing the Progress of the Survey in Section No. V, from 1847 to 1858 depicts the locations of "Morell" land and chimneys on Ossabaw. No specific roads, structures, or other features are depicted on this map.

The 1860 Ossabaw Sound, Vernon and Ogeechee Rivers, Georgia coastal survey map shows only the northern portion of Ossabaw. Daniel Elliot observes this is the first map taken from a U.S. Coast Survey showing significant features that reflect cultural features and improvements

on the North End Plantation. The Map shows a row of nine closely packed slave buildings found north of Canepatch Road. East of these building are larger buildings that could be related to the core buildings of the plantation. This map also shows investment in the landscape in the form of roads, fields, and water access routes. The North End tract is represented with numerous fields, roads, and structures. Also shown is "Indian Mound", Cane Patch (9CH35).

The 1861 Lindenkohl Sketch of the Atlantic coast of the United States from Savannah River to St. Marys River shows Ossabaw in its entirety, however, only the northern half of the island is represented in a detailed manner. It is unknown why the South End which was in use at this time was not depicted. In general, the Lindenkohl map shows several roads and one structure.

The 1863 Lindenkohl Sketch of the Sea Coast of South Carolina and Georgia from Bull's Bay to Ossabaw Sound only depict a portion of Ossabaw. The North End tract is represented by one road and two structures. Also represented in this map is Fort Seymour on Bradley Point.

The two 1867 NOAA St. Catherines Sound coastal survey maps are representative of only the southern portion of Ossabaw. The South End tract is demonstrated with the presence of roads, fields, and ten structures.

The 1879 NOAA Ossabaw Sound, Vernon and Ogeechee River Georgia coast survey map presents only the North End of the Island. The information on this map appears to be replicated from the 1860 version.

The 1881 O.M. Poe map illustrating the defence [sic] of Savannah, GA. and the operations resulting in its capture by the army commanded by Maj. Genl. W.T Sherman, Dec. 21st, 1864 shows all but the very southern portion of Ossabaw. All four areas of the island and their associated fields, roads, and structures on each are depicted on this map. Also shown is "Indian Mound" which is the site Cane Patch (9CH35). While this map has a date of 1881, the features depicted are from 1864.

The 1895 O.M. Poe map of Savannah, Georgia and Vicinity presents a detailed view of Ossabaw and includes all four areas of the island and their associated fields, roads, and structures on each. Also shown is "Indian Mound", which is the site Cane Patch (9CH35). While this map has a date of 1895, the features depicted are from 1864.

The 1895 NOAA Coast Chart No. 156, from Savannah to Sapelo Island Georgia depicts the island of Ossabaw and includes all four areas and their associated fields, roads, and structures. Also shown is "Indian Mound", which is the site Cane Patch (9CH35). The 1899, 1901, 1908, 1910, 1916, and 1919 Coast Charts No. 156 from Savannah to Sapelo Island appear to be identical to the 1899 chart. On this map, it states that the date of first publication was 1876. However, I have been unable to locate a copy of this first iteration.

The 1897 map of the Georgia Coast by Clarence B. Moore shows Ossabaw with rough location of the mounds excavated, assigned by numbers, at Middle Place and Bluff Field. Also shown is Cane Patch, represented by an "X".

The 1905 NOAA St. Catherines Sound coastal survey map is representative of only the southern portion of Ossabaw. The South End tract is demonstrated by the presence of roads, fields, and ten structures. However it should be noted, this map is identical to the 1867 NOAA St. Catherines Sound coastal survey maps in its depictions of the roads, fields, and structures.

The 1910 Nautical Chart of Ossabaw Sound details the North End Plantation. Many of the structures present on the 1860 map are present on this map, but could have been copied over from the original map and no longer present.

The 1911 Ossabaw Sound: Vernon and Ogeechee Rivers Nautical Chart depicts the plantations on the North End of Ossabaw. Detailed are the many estates and hunting lodges established on former plantations. The Wanamaker "Club House" on the old North End plantation is detailed.

The 1918 U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Georgia Ossabaw Island quadrangle map shows Ossabaw Island in its entirety. All four areas of the island are represented with a combination of structures, roads, artesian wells, and fields.

The 1927 NOAA Ossabaw Sound and St. Catherines Sound coastal chart shows Ossabaw Island in its entirety, but the only features depicted on the map are roads.

The 1937 NOAA Ossabaw Sound and St. Catherines Sound coastal chart shows Ossabaw Island in its entirety. Roads are depicted that transverse the island but no roads are shown to go into the South End tract. Two structures are apparent on the North End portion of the island and there are structures (one appears to be in Newell Creek-a dock). The 1968 NOAA Ossabaw Sound and St. Catherines Sound coastal chart, 1971 and 1977 NOAA Ossabaw Sound and St. Catherines Sound coastal charts appear to be identical to the 1937 chart.

The 1974 Archaeological Survey of Ossabaw Island by Chester DePratter depicts all identified archaeological sites on Ossabaw known at the time of the survey.

The 1979 map of Ossabaw Island by Eleanor Torrey West shows the entire island. Various cultural features are present such as roads, landings, the beached boat Eleanor I, as well as structures on the northern portion of the island. Also included on this map are artesian wells.

The 1996 Sketch map of Historic Resources at North End of Island featured in the 1996 National Register Nomination includes cultural features on the northern portion of the island. On the North End site, the three tabby cabins, barn, tabby Oyster House, Boarding House, Wanamaker House (Clubhouse), and Torrey's Landing are depicted. On the Torrey West estate, the Studio and Stable, Main House, Caretaker's house, and Main House are depicted.

The 2007 Building and Potential Buildings, North End Plantation by Dan Elliott (2007) shows 23 areas on the North End that either depict structures or locations of potential historic structures.

Cultural Features in Historic Photographs and Maps

This section details the five areas of the island in respect to cultural features that are present on maps and in historic photographs. We list known maps that reflect various cultural resources and include a brief summary. It should be noted here that while these maps provide useful information about the location of structures, likely there were a number of outbuildings and other agricultural related structures that existed, but would not be depicted on maps. Therefore, we recognize that this list is by no means conclusive. There are likely many structures not yet identified or missed here than were once used on the island. Also not included are the more modern structures in use today, which include but are not limited to the DNR housing, barns, garages on the North End, the building used on the South End as a hunt camp, and the camping facilities, picnic shelters on various parts of the island (http://www.ossabawisland.org/).

North End

Representing the longest and most intense occupations during the historic period, the North End region of Ossabaw has seen the most preservation of its historic structures. Due to the high concentration of extant structures, the greatest efforts of preservation have focused on this area. Elliott (2005, 2007) and Honerkamp (2011a) have located many subsurface historic features through archaeological research. Most of the remaining structures represent plantation life during the 18th and 19th century. Most notably rehabilitated are the tabby cabins, the Clubhouse, and the Boarding House (also sometimes referred to as the Bachelor's House). The tabby Smoke House (also called the Oyster House, Power House, and Ice House), open fields and fence remnants also remain, reflecting the historic use of the area. A possible cistern is also located by the Smokehouse. A variety of structures were present during the historic use of the North End as reflected in Table 1. This table also lists eight different maps that depict the various cultural resources on the North End (Appendix D). Historic photographs show the following: tabby cabins, "oyster house", Clubhouse, Boarding House, game breeding sheds, maintenance complex, and the butcher shop (now the field lab). We also include for reference in Appendix E, photographs of Burke et al. (2007) building assessment report of the Smokehouse. The above mentioned structures as well as other unidentified structures can be seen in historical photographs (see Appendix F). Appendix F also includes modern photographs of various structures which show the historic preservation efforts undertaken in this area.

Middle Place

Middle Place represents another area of the island with standing structures. There are some maps and photographs available that depict numerous structures throughout the years. A variety of structures were present during the historic use of Middle Place, as reflected in Table 2. This table also lists seven different maps that depict the various cultural resources at Middle Place (Appendix G). While most of these historic buildings have not been located, there are some visible tabby remnants of former slave structures as well as the modified tabby overseer's house that reflect the plantation use of the site. We also include for reference in Appendix H and I, drawings and photographs from Burke et al. (2007:Appendix B and C) building assessment report for the tabby overseer's residence, as well as tabby slave structures and chimney remnants (Burke 2008: Appendix B, D). Also remaining on the landscape are structures from the Genesis Project Era, and it is likely that the structures currently standing will suffer unless there is more routine maintenance and care. There are some photographs that depict buildings constructed during this time as well as structures that were repurposed such as shacks and barns from timbering operations as well as the tabby overseer's house (Appendix J). Photographs also include images of the cook shack, ice house, and tower house. Other associated buildings from the Genesis Project still remain, but not all have been identified. Future research should take into account the care and preservation of these buildings. Open fields and fence remnants remain, reflecting the historic use of the area. To date, little preservation efforts have been undertaken.

The tabby structures have the potential to provide a substantial understanding of the plantation use of the site. One structure represented on maps and in two historic photographs is a late 19th century house that burned in the 1930s. Another product of the human use of the island is the large sawdust pile, a leftover byproduct from the earlier timbering operations. This period of use had shacks and barns as well.

Buckhead

Historic documentation on Buckhead is minimal; however, Table 3 demonstrates that there were a number of structures as well as fields and roads that were present during the plantation use of the area. This table also lists five different maps that depict the various cultural resources at Buckhead (Appendix K). In general, only a few photographs depict cultural activity at Buckhead. Seen in Appendix L, these photographs include two different houses used by tenant farmers (however the photograph with the "Coolers" may actually be at South End) as well as a more recent photograph of Sandy West's private cabin. The private cabin is no longer used and is in a state of deteriorating condition. A brick chimney foundation and portions of fencing, as well as open fields are still present in Buckhead field.

South End

The South End perhaps has a large quantity of historical records available from its use as a plantation during the 1850s; however, documentation of earlier operations at the site is minimal. Currently, we do not know what structures were used during the Morel occupation of the South End. However, there are six maps that reflect locations of structures that were used during the Kollock plantation period (Table 4 and Appendix M). Likely, some of the structures included on the maps were an overseer's house and slave cabins. Similar to Middle Place, the South End also has a large sawdust pile from the earlier timbering operations. While no visible structures can be found at the South End, open areas from previous agricultural operations remain. There are few historic photographs of the South End (Appendix N). These photographs show structures associated with tenant farming activities as well as hunting. Two photographs show a 1970s house on the South End, this has eroded into Newell Creek and excavations in 2014 likely uncovered a small portion of the brick foundation (Ritchison et al. 2016). Erosion is a serious problem on the South End. Noted first in 1978 when the site was first recorded, there may be up to 70 cm of loss along the bluff yearly (Robinson et al. 2010; Ritchison et al. 2016). Recording features as they erode out of the bank has become a routine part of the archaeological investigations at the site (Honerkamp 2011b and 2011c; Elliott 2008b; Ritchison et al. 2016). Appendix N shows recent photographic examples of cultural resources that are eroding into the creek.

Torrey West Estate

The private occupation on the island exists here by the presence of the Torrey West Estate. Although the remaining matriarch currently occupies the estate, an established agreement and transfer of property to the State of Georgia is in place following her passing. Such an agreement assures the preservation and management of the estate, its complex history, and potential use by the Department of Natural Resources for research and continued conservation of the island. The question of preservation of the estate will be addressed in the future and will become a concern for the state and the Ossabaw Island Foundation. Representations of structures on the Torrey West Estate are not featured on maps; however, there are numerous photographs that depict various structures on the property (Appendix O). The primary cultural features include the Main House, Stable and Studio, Little House, the Shop, the Caretaker's House, and the Formal Gardens.

Other Cultural Features

Records indicate that there are some other cultural features on the island that fall outside of the above discussed areas. On a 1979 map, created by Eleanor Torrey West are the locations of the various landings (8 total), roads, the rough location of two old beach houses (those represented in Foskey 2001), as well as the area on the southern portion of the island where the boat Eleanor I was beached (Appendix P). Other shipwrecks besides the one discussed by Elliott (2008c) could be located on the island as there are numerous shipwrecks located near the island. Another cultural resource to note here is Fort Seymour, located on the northern tip of Ossabaw. The exact location of the fort has not been identified, likely due to shifting dune sand. The 1863 Lindenkohl Sketch of the Sea Coast of South Carolina and Georgia from Bull's Bay to Ossabaw Sound shows its rough location (see Appendix C). There are numerous roads, paved and unpaved, throughout the island. Some of these, like the Main Road, have been in existence since the beginning of the Morel occupation. The National Register nomination (Edwards 1996)

provides information on the various roads on the island. Mile markers, dating to the eighteenth century, can still be found along this road (see Appendix P for a photo).

Archaeological Resources

In total there are currently 259 archaeological sites recorded on Ossabaw Island in the Georgia Archaeological Site File (GASF); this does not include the number of sites recorded on adjacent hammocks (for a brief description of the archaeological sites see Edwards 1996). The sites recorded span the Late Archaic (4500 to 3100 B.P.) up to historic sites of the plantation period and later twentieth century (see DePratter 1974; Pearson 1975). The majority of sites recorded stem from the work by Chester DePratter and Charles Pearson in the 1970s (DePratter 1974; Pearson 1975). Archaeological information presented here is basic as the majority of sites on the island have not had research since their initial recording. Appendix Q contains location of sites by time period on Ossabaw. The North End, Middle Place, Buckhead, and South End have had the most archaeological investigations thus far (see Appendix A for associated reports and articles).

Native American Sites and Architecture

From a management perspective, all the sites on the island need to be reexamined to determine their occupational history. We know that some of the sites in the Georgia Archaeological State Site File are miscoded regarding their chronology. For example, the GASF indicates no Middle Mississippian sites on the island. We know this is incorrect because Pearson (2001:19) notes that Middle Place, the largest prehistoric site on the island, contains a large Savannah period component, which dates to the Middle Mississippian period. A comprehensive reassessment of the available data is needed to correct these inconsistences.

In addition, there are a number of mounds located at various places on the island, many of which occur at the above named tracts. All of these should be relocated and potential mounds mapped and entered into a database to aid in the management of these structures. The need to map these structures is imperative as many have been excavated, destroyed, or plowed down making their identification difficult. Over time, erosion of these features and other taphonomic processes will make them even more difficult if not impossible to identify in the future.

Discussion

The information detailed above provides an initial look into the amount and type of structures at the North End, Middle Place, Buckhead, the South End, and the Torrey West Estate. While, we can pinpoint exactly the function of some these historic structures, such as the tabby cabins, Boarding House, and Clubhouse on the North End, the function of the others are unknown. Elliott (2007) and Honerkamp (2011c) have identified many of the historic resources at the North End and Price (2007) at Middle Place has conducted similar work, but in general little research at identifying location and function of historic structures has been accomplished on other areas on the island.

We do know that the island has had a variety of structures built since the island first came under Morel ownership in the 1760s. At the North End, there were a series of tabby cabins for slaves, as well as a main house. Middle Place was similar with tabby cabins including a larger tabby cabin which was likely the overseer's house, and a large main house. The South End also had slave houses but these were probably constructed out of wood with brick and tabby pilings rather than entirely out of tabby. Buckhead also likely had slave houses constructed in a similar way. Although little documentation exists that describe additional buildings, each area would have had a number of outbuildings and other structures. When the island was used for recreational purposes, such as hunting, there were likely structures associated with those activities, such as the gaming sheds shown in two historic photographs. Later tenant utilization of the island would have resulted in houses and barns, as well as other structures of unknown function on each land tract. Timber operations on the South End and at Middle Place would have also had a variety of structures built to accommodate those endeavors. After the island was purchased by the Torreys, a Spanish Colonial Revival home was built on the northern end of the island in 1926. At Middle Place during the Genesis Project in the 1970s, various structures were built as well as a repurposing of older structures also occurred (most notably, the tabby overseer's house). Middle Place resources are perhaps the most threatened at current. With no major effort made to survey the current conditions of these resources, it is impossible to understand the challenge that awaits. Extant plantation period buildings, structures, and objects are better understood for their connection to the Savannah market economy that thrived in the region. However, the Genesis Project Era, perhaps because of its recent age, has not been addressed for preservation. Tree houses, antebellum tabby structures, and other structures are being consumed by the environment that surrounds them.

Historic Preservation and conservation of extant structures along Georgia's Coast is an on-going battle with the environment. Some of Ossabaw's cultural resources are endangered of being swept into the surrounding waters, as is evident the most dramatically at the South End. Other remaining structures, including tabby ruins, Genesis Project buildings and structures, as well as

the Torrey West Estate, are all subject to everyday environmental impacts and degradation. Preservation and conservation of cultural resources across the island has been discussed by various researchers, and should serve as fodder for the development of additional actions and programmatic management of resources. Private ownership and management of the Torrey West Estate has ensured, for the time being, that the mansion is taken care of and the grounds are to an extent, managed. In the future, as the property falls under the purview of the state, an implemented management plan should include the preservation and conservation of these resources. We understand that the management efforts to maintain buildings on a place such as Ossabaw present numerous challenges. Additionally, on-going archaeological research across the island may provide an additional understanding of the future management needs on the island. Aside from erosion, which has resulted in the loss of prehistoric and historic archaeological materials, data collected during excavation and survey can provide ample background information to understand the long term processes and occupations for each area of the island. Preservation is not simply intended to consider and manage extant structures, although that is quite common. Preservation is necessary to conserve and inform future work of researchers, planners, and citizens.

Future Recommendations

In terms of future research, there are a vast number of questions that have the potential to be addressed within the realms of archaeology, historical documentation, and preservation. As mentioned above, the changing coastal environment presents challenges to preservation and threats to the cultural resources of the island. Some areas, such as Middle Place, have structures that could be currently considered the most threatened due to the lack of preservation efforts. Other preservation concerns involve the Torrey West estate, and are being discussed between the state and Ossabaw Island Foundation.

In general, more research is needed. For example all extant structures not yet investigated should

be recorded and include at minimum such information as photographs, construction techniques, architectural form and quality, and presented with plans for preservation. A detailed cultural landscape survey of each area needs to be conducted (see http://www.nps.gov/cultural landscapes/Documents/Guide to Cultural Landscapes.pdf). There have been some Historic American Building Surveys (HABS) conducted as part of class or intern projects on the North End (Burke 2007, 2008; Burke et al 2007) as well as the reports created by Fore (2004, 2005). However, work such as these reports should also be conducted on the remaining extant structures on other areas of the island. At some point, there was a subgroup formed to present recommendations about the archaeological and cultural resources on Ossabaw (Waller 2000). While in need of an update, this document outlines suggestions for research methods and management. Future research should explore this document and take into account the recommendations for archaeological, historical, preservation, conservation, and management processes and practices. Another document that should be consulted is the 2004 report written by Georgia State University students (Barrickman et al. 2004). Although written specifically for the historic structures on the North End, this report contains information on the preservation and conservation of the tabby, that should be considered with reference to the tabby structures at Middle Place, for example.

A further analysis of archival resources (maps, documents, photographs, oral histories, etc.) should also take place. While there are documents that relay important information about some areas of the island (North End and South End primarily) the other areas, such as Buckhead and Middle Place, are lacking in documentary sources. It will be important for future research to go through existing resources, as well as investigate the potential for other archival sources that could shed light on other areas of Ossabaw. Lastly, a digitization and transcription of all pertinent historic documents should be undertaken. In terms of archaeological research, varieties of cultural features on Ossabaw are known from historic maps or photographs but have yet to be identified archaeologically. Georeferencing historical maps would aid in not only potentially identifying unknown cultural features but would provide an aid for preservation efforts. In addition, creating and analyzing LiDAR (light detection and ranging) could also be beneficial in identifying the location of cultural features. These should be incorporated in a island wide ArcGIS file. Detailed shovel test surveys could reveal further information about the historic landscape. Additionally, remote sensing surveys (including GPR, magnetometry, and resistivity) should also be conducted alongside any shovel tests or excavations. Future archaeological research should not neglect the historic components and include areas known to have had structures, so that these areas can be delineated and preserved. Finally, in terms of adding to the knowledge of recorded sites, there are a large number with unknown components. It would be useful, for these sites to be relocated and to update the site forms with additional information about their time period.

Nearly the entirety of Ossabaw, with its long history of human occupation, has some form of cultural resources present, and while this brief report primarily compiles previous research and resources thus far, it indicates that there is still much work that can and should be done. The preliminary inventory and bibliographic index presented here is meant to be starting point for researchers. It is hoped that this report will help to contribute to the understanding of the many different cultural resources on Ossabaw Island on the Georgia Coast.
















Photo. 1021. North elevation of frame addition's door hinge.






Photo. 1029. West elevation of frame exterior.




Photo. 1030. West elevation frame addition window.








Photo. 1064. West elevation of south tabby exterior.




Photo. 1067. South elevation of tabby gable end.




Photo. 1068. South elevation of tabby gable end.




Photo. 1070. South elevation of tabby gable end close-up.





Photo. 1075. South elevation tabby gable end window close-up.




Photo. 1083 (left). Remaining tabby corner facing west. Photo.1084 (above). Remaining tabby corner and BBQ facing west.




Photo. 1091 (left) Interior of southwest tabby door. Photo. 1092 (right). Interior of southwest tabby door close-up.






Photo. 1093. Interior of southwest tabby door, right side of frame.




Photo. 1095. Interior of south tabby room.




Photo. 1098. Interior of south elevation window.




Photo. 1103. Interior of north shared tabby door way.




Photo. 1106. Interior above shared wall at wood stove pipe.




Photo. 1104. Interior of shared tabby wall, facing north.




Photo. 1108. Interior of east wall in south tabby.




Photo. 1124. Interior southeast elevation frame wall close-up.




Photo. 1126. Interior of south frame east elevation.




Photo. 1123. Interior of south frame room's ceiling.




Photo. 1125. Interior south frame of southeast corner.




Photo. 1129. Tabby wall interior of Frame Addition facing south.




Photo. 1131. Tabby wall interior of frame addition facing south-close-up of nailed door.




Photo. 1139. Interior of north frame tabby's north elevation.




Photo. 1140. Interior north tabby's east elevation.








Photo. 1156. Interior of south frame looking into north frame.




Photo. 1151. Interior tabby. Close-up of roof.







Photo. 1170. Interior of north frame west elevation.




Photo. 1167. Interior of north frame. Close-up of ceiling edge.




Photo. 1171. Interior of north frame west elevation window.




Photo. 1173. Interior of north frame east elevation.














1760 Henri Yonge and William DeBrahm map showing area of Buckhead.




1855 William Hughes plat map showing boundaries of Buckhead.




Buckhead as represented on the 1895 NOAA Coast Chart No. 156 from Savannah to Sapelo Island, Georgia.






1760 Henri Yonge and William DeBrahm map showing area of the South End.






1867 NOAA St. Catherines Sound coastal survey map showing the South End.














Gate to Main House on the Torrey West Estate (Edwards 1996).








Main House Floor Plan (Edwards 1996).


































Density of Late Archaic and Early Woodland sites on Ossabaw Island, Georgia.
